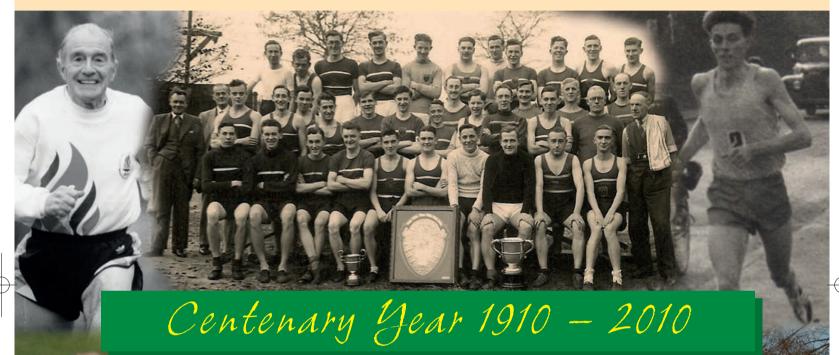

CLUB YOUNG ATHLETE AWARD 2009

Each year the club chooses two young athletes – a male and female who, in the opinion of the executive committee after consultations with coaches and team managers, merit the Darren Campbell MBE award for their athletic achievements throughout the year. This year's recipients are:-

Niall Brooks:

Niall has had an excellent 2009. Coached by Norman Poole the highlight undoubtedly was his 800m silver medal in the European Junior Championships held in Serbia. He topped the U/20 rankings in both 800m and 1500m registering 1m 47.99secs and 3m 41.64secs respectively, both achieved in BMC Nike Grand prix events. He then finished his season scoring a most impressive 1500m victory in the National Junior Final.

Abigail Haywood:

Abigail maintained her annual prominence in the Pole Vault rankings, finishing a close 4th in an extremely competitive U/20 age group, with a PB of 3m 95cms. A silver medal in the English U/20 championships, as well as the Northern u/20, plus a 6th place in the Senior Aviva World Trials, was topped by a victory in the English Schools Championships with a 3m 80cms clearance.

THE ANGELA DEEGAN MEMORIAL RACE

Angela Deegan died last June aged just 51 after a long battle with cancer. She was a Sale Harrier for twenty-seven of those years from when she first joined in 1981 after team manager Eric Hughes saw her finish 18th in the National Cross-Country for Bromsgrove AC. Later that year she married her husband Mike and, just five years after she started running, displayed her ability by finishing 2:50 in the first London Marathon. More recently, Angela took on responsibilities coaching and managing youngsters in the club until her illness prevented her. Her children Rachel & Tom have both represented the club and Rachel continues to excel as a middle-distance athlete. In her memory, Andems runners are staging a 2 lap, wheel measured 5, 000 Metres race around the scenic Cowm Reservoir at 3pm, Saturday 26th June 2010 from the Cock & Magpie, Cockhall Lane, Whitworth, Rochdale. 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BOB'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Club coach Bob Gaisie was invited by UKA to attend as a UK representative to join the World Class Coaches Club in Berlin. This tremendous honour resulted in attending the recent World Championships in Berlin and afterwards the first World Class Coaching Conference. This pinnacle in his career came after a lifetime given to athletics which began at the age of 15 when he was invited by Helen Nichols & the "Nichols Clan" to join Sale Harriers. He joined Peter Schofield's training squad which produced such big names as Carl Hamilton, Earl Tulloch, Ian Saunders, Derek Price & co. He himself became a Manchester & Northern Junior Sprint champion with PB's of 10.65s & 21.60s. He turned to coaching in 1993 after a few years playing American football for the Manchester Spartans & Great Britain and the following are his list of achievements:-

AN EXPERIENCE TO SAVOR...

Berlin 2009... World Championships... Usain Bolt.... Jess Ennis.... Jenny Meadows... and Iil ol' me! Yes... I was there!

For 12 days and nights... athletics on the world stage was my diet (plus the odd litre or so of fine German beer!!) Frank Dick is the inspirational lead in creating a platform to promote and encourage the development of coaches b y experiencing the 'real world' experience of the World Championships.

Throughout the championships I had the opportunity to watch, talk to and observe some of the worlds' most successful coaches. As well as a few unsuccessful ones... Yelena Isinbayeva's coach suddenly decided he didn't speak English when I asked what went wrong! (Oops !) Some were invited to meet with the group and hold "private audiences" where we were invited to quiz the coaches and not be star struck... but how do you ask Glen Mills "what's your secret?" I did... but I ain't telling you the answer!

I also had access to all areas and was able to observe athletes in the warm up area and experience first hand how they cope with the pressure and more importantly how to prepare for the biggest competition of their lives.

There was some work to do also... Prior to travelling to Berlin we had to submit an assignment on two coaches from my chosen event "comparing coaching philosophy/concept of coaching and their coaching methods". Once in Berlin we were tasked with building a coaching network and contact database which we hope will one day develop into an internet based resource for coaches at all levels.

On a daily basis we had access to technical data and held discussion each night on "events of the day" (You can imagine the discussions following Bolts World record in the 100m or Isinbayevas' failure to win!)

Immediately after the Finals (and the closing night party... shhh!) we travelled to Keinbaum which is a specialist training centre built in the old "East Germany days" for the development of all athletes. The German national teams use this centre in preparation for major championships and as you can imagine the facilities, location and attention to detail was amazing.

Here we attended the first World Class Coaching Conference and had another opportunity to listen to some of the worlds best on their coaching philosophies and expectations.

The whole experience has opened my eyes as to what experiences and opportunities are out there and that the learning experience can be a very enjoyable one.

I would encourage all coaches to seek to further develop their knowledge, experience and to take up the opportunity to explore the new opportunities being provided by UKA and England Athletics Coach Development strategies.

For me... Berlin was simply...an experience I will never ever forget...

Reading this report in the wake of the Christmas/New Year celebrations, last September's men's 6-stage and women's 4stage annual relays, sandwiched between the end of the summer T & F season and the cross-country, will be a remote and distant memory. Then, team Manager's ERIC HUGHES and DAVE RODGERS poured over selecting teams to pit against the two Northern giants - Chester-Le-Street whose women were challenging for their fourth consecutive title and three-times defending Champions Leeds City AC whose men were again anticipated to take no prisoners. Last year's women's runners up, Kendal AC were also in contention and neighbours Alty AC could surprise again by retaining their men's runners-up position.

Running clubs throughout the land are a gravevard of potentially great teams fallen victim to last minute withdrawals invariably labelled 'sickness' and 'injury'. Sale Harriers Manchester has been no exception to the demise and this year Dave Rodgers, though he says he doesn't invest heavily in this Northern championship, had circulated motivational memos to muster teams capable of 'challenging' and a 'B' team to qualify for the TREET beavered to assemble women's teams capable of the honours of former years and Joanne Street, did sterling work to recruit the first 'B' team for many years from the Crossford Bridge squad. As almost anticipated, all their hard work fell victim in those perilous final hours before 'D' Day to the traditional last minute demise.

Leeds City AC duly completed their hat-trick of victories with a close scrap for the minor medals and five seconds separating Salford AC, Altrincham AC and Morpeth AC finishing in that order. We weren't, therefore, among them but the consolation of finishing ninth was that it was an improvement on last year's twelfth and the 'B' team's 34th placing was also a big improvement. Thanks for the efforts lads – NIALL BROOKS (8th), SIMON MILLS (9TH), GAZ RAVEN (3RD & 6TH fastest), JAMES BAILEY (4TH), ADAM ELLIOTT (6TH) and ROB FLANNERY (9th). The 'B' team compromised MARTIN KILMARTIN, JAMES WIGNALL, PAUL BARRETT, LEE WOODS, PHIL TEDD & JASON BOWERS.

Among the invaluable missing women were Louise Whittaker and Emily Beadham and instead relative club newcomers Hannah Griffiths and Cara Kavanagh stepped up to join Donna Riding (Now Jones actuallycongratulations to both Donna and Andy who married in the summer) and Rachel Deegan who was most heroic to compete so shortly after her Mum's untimely death from cancer. The 'B' and C teams were also decimated but JACKIE CORDINGLEY, SIAN HOLLAND, BELINDA HAMMOND, ALISON PYE and JO STREET all made the journey.

Donna battled hard to hand over to Hannah Griffiths in 4th position. Hannah made an extremely solid debut to hand over to Rachel in 11th position who, once again proved her strength by claiming back six places before handing over to Cara, also making her debut, for the last leg to finish 9th overall. It was a decent improvement on last years 15th. Well done, girls.

In the 'B' team, JACKY CORDINGLY handled her daunting first leg with confidence to hand over to SIAN HOLLAND who had a brilliant run gaining 6 places and proving that she actually should have been in the 'A' team. JO STREET gained another place before handing over to ALISON PYE. Alison, who though she's left Manchester for a new job, proved she's not completely neglected her running by having a strong last leg to bring the 'B' team home in 29th position. In the 'C' team newcomer Belinda Hammond also bravely made her road relays debut and the experience will stand her in good stead for future events- well done Belinda.

Chester-le-Street had no problem taking their fourth title with Hallamshire and Liverpool AC taking the minor medals. We have the potential to be also medallists. Let's hope so for next year.

The girls then enjoyed the Leeds sunshine and cheered on the boys from a brilliant vantage point at the entrance to the track.

IENS & WOMEN'S ROAD RELAY CHAMPIONSHIPS

Two weeks after the Northern Relays, our teams headed south to Birmingham for the National men's six-stage and women's 4-stage road relays championships to pit themselves against Britain's best from the North-East to the South-West. The long-time Mecca of road relay championship, Sutton Park was at its glorious autumnal best and with conditions perfect for distance running. It was a day to pull out top performances!

Those clubs that best succeed in these (and similar championships) are often not those that have the best athletes but those that have managed to avoid injury and illness. These are the peril of every club and SHM is all too often among them!

This blight of every team manager again afflicted DAVE RODGERS and ERIC HUGHES' teams (with JO STREET deputizing) and even more adversely than in the Northern Relays. As a result, our men finished their lowest ever position of 34th - a long way from last year's fifth and fourth in 2007. However, it was an uncharacteristic blip and DAVE RODGERS is already straining on his leash to remedy this disappointment next year.

MATT BOND was in superb form as he had been over those weeks generally and recorded his fastest ever time, 30 seconds quicker than last year; GAZ RAVEN will remember 2009 as his best. On top of PB's in almost every distance, several international selections and topped by his GB debut, he has brilliantly represented the club in these relays for over a decade. He typically ate up the ground again to record his fastest ever time by nearly 15 seconds to bring the team into 6th place. Wot a veteran!

JAMES BAILEY was not his zippy self on the third leg; young JAMIE RODEN and ANDY WORLAND did extremely well as juniors in this tough senior arena. ROBERT FLANNERY struggled on the anchor leg but, by goodness, how it spurred him on in training for a while afterwards

Newham & Essex Beagles, who'd won the British Athletic League for the second consecutive year this summer, unseated last year's victors Belgrave AC. Aldershot/Farnham & District took the bronze medals.

In the women's team, only DONNA JONES (nee Riding) and team manager JO STREET made it to the start line. Donna is an exceptional stalwart who has made a team difference over the years with her consistent performances. JO STREET produced a time consistent with last year which must have partly consoled her disappointment in having her team fall apart at the eleventh hour.

Aldershot/Farnham & District gained their third successive women's title and added to their men's bronze medals meant a very successful day. Northern champions Chester-Le-Street took the silver medals and City of Norwich the bronze.

In the U/17 girl's race, SARAH SIMEEN was competing in this national arena for the fourth consecutive year and was the most experienced of the girls. KATE McLELLAND ran a great second stage and also displayed her growing experience whilst, on the final stage, ALICE FITTON, a product of last year's U/15 team, further improved her team position to 33rd.

Aldershot, Farnham & District won all the three national titles for the fourth successive year - some achievement !!

We had no boy's teams turn out! Indeed, the club younger end of boys has not made an impact in these championships for several years. In the past decade, we've turned out only three U/13 boy's teams four U/15 teams and an U/15 team five times. Interestingly, it was the southern teams who dominated throughout these championships.

The course programme was based around 'Winter Preparation for Summer Rewards' with the athletes gaining experience of training twice a day in a running camp environment. Also included were lectures and practical work on tactics, winter training, stretching, conditioning, diet and massage.

THE ENGLISH CROSS-COUNTRY RELAYS

Unenviable records at Mansfield

The Saucony English Cross Country Relays, held annually at Berry Hill Park, Mansfield, showed even more growth this year for its 20th Anniversary event. It was another record occasion but not all the records were in SHM's favour! 737 teams from all over Britain competed in the traditional 10 races. On a bright sunny day ideal for fast times, the competition was fierce and the large number of supporters created a great atmosphere.

Our under 15 Boys got the day off to a reasonable start. Freshly crowned Northern Relay champions, they lined up with the 107 other teams. ALEX BIRCHALL, who also took the first leg in their Northern relay victory, handed the baton to KYLE CONWAY for the second stage in a satisfactory fifteenth place. Kyle did a fine job to improve the team's position two further places. DILLON BEZZINA, the other member of the successful Northern Relay trio, improved even further to bring the team home in twelfth place.

The U/15 girls were next! Sadly, however, we had no-one among the record 95 teams. It's a question worth pondering how Aldershot, Farnham & District can, year after year, win four of the young girls national titles and be runners-up in two of the boys events when so many other national clubs like hours struggle to attract/retain youngsters.

The events moved swiftly and in the 3rd race of the day it was the U/13 girls who went into action. Again, we had no one to line up among the massive field of 105 teams. Our neighbours Vale Royal were the early leaders but once again it was Aldershot who took the title.

There was no time to draw breath before the U/13 boys got under way with another record of 88 teams. Yet again we had no team! Again, what is it about U/13 champions Tonbridge Wells that they were able to finish three teams

in twelve... and be last year's runner's up when clubs like ours are clearly struggling?

In bright sunshine, the Junior Women's race had a field of 36 teams and again the hot favourites were Aldershot/Farnham & District, who've won this age-group 's title for eight of the last nine years, Neighbours Stockport AC were the early leaders. For the fourth consecutive race, again, we had no team toeing the line...

The U/17 Women were on the course at the same time as the Junior Women starting seven minutes behind. In this race again AFD made it four out of four on the female side of things and won by over half a minute. For the fifth consecutive race, Sale Harriers Manchester was not represented... and thus our own unenviable record of the first time in the club's history we've not entered or completed a team in 50% of the events in this major championship.

The action packed day was two thirds through when the Junior Men started and this was to be the pinnacle of our day. Young talent JAMIE RODEN set off with gutsy determination and passed on the baton to RYAN WORLAND who also powered round the course to improve the team's placing six positions and finish twentysecond. It was then down to NIALL BROOKS, ranked as one of Europe's top middle distance runners who'd won silver at the summer European Junior Championships. Eating up the ground, he hauled in no less than thirteen 'scalps' to bring the team home ninth, the sections best result since 1999 when they finished second.

The under 17 Men followed the Junior Men and this was very much a Southern battle between Shaftesbury Barnet, AFD, and Ipswich who took the honours in that order. Coach PAUL RODEN didn't have access to his best squad and although CHARLIE HULSON brought home the team in an impressive second place, CALLUM GREENWOOD and CALLUM ROWLINSON couldn't match this ability despite valiant performances and the team finished – yes, another record, a lowly thirty-fifth.

It was then onto the senior races with the Women first and a mammoth 104 teams toed the line. Yet again, we had problems mustering a team and created another unenviable record. Our 35th finishing position was our lowest ever in these championships! EMILY HEIGHWAY left her Loughborough haven for her first club race in a long time. JENNA HILL on the second leg, has represented the club in these championships through all the age-groups for more than a decade. She showed her loyalty yet again and, despite not fully fit, brought the team from 52nd to hand over to SIAN HOLLAND in 32nd place. Sian's ability has moved onto another level this year and she brought the team home 35th. A 'B' team of JAN NICHOLLS, ALISON PYF and IYNDA ROWI INSON finished 60th Charnwood retained the title they won last year. Bristol & West took the silver medal while Woodford Green with Essex Ladies were third.

The Senior Men joined 164 other teams for the day's pièce de résistance. Although the battle for medals at the front end was intense, DAVE RODGERS' 'A' team was fighting their own battle further down the field. MATT BOND, on the first leg, was the right man for the job. Running fifteen seconds faster than last year, he finished 18th. Matt's been in superb form proven with a superb PB of 30.11 in September's Cardiff 10k. GLEN COMISH, on the second leg, was returning to fitness and uncharacteristically slipped to 28th. JAMES BAILEY pulled it back to 18th with a fine performance, a position that anchorman SIMON MILLS held. Although this was the first time the senior men were outside the top ten for 12 years, it was an acceptable result in the circumstances. The 'B' team of MIKE HATCH (75TH), PAUL ROWLEY (85TH), LEE WHITLEY (82ND) and MIKE KILMARTIN finished 79th.

Despite the wet conditions, over 500 young athletes, parents and supporters attended the annual unique 'Over the Bales' cross country races from across the North West, staged at Crossford Bridge, Sale.

The beginning of October saw him compete in the Langdale Horseshoe (14miles, 4000m ascent).

The race attracted a large field as a counter in the English Fell Running championships, and a solid performance placed him 3rd V65 in 4:24:00. At the end of October, he participated in the OMM (Original Mountain Marathon) in which he and his teammate ran in the Medium-score class. After a total of 11hrs running over 2 days, their team finished 12th out of 76 teams in the veteran's handicap and 166th overall... amazing!

Two weeks later and the Roaches Fell Race (15miles, 3700m ascent). Roger finished 181st in 3hrs 31min, closely followed by 0/55 NIGEL FIELDEN. It was great to have Nigel back in action after a long period out from racing, to place 186th in 3hrs 38min.

The cold weather doesn't put off the hardy fell runner, and the beginning of December saw Roger manage 3rd O/65 in the Rab Mini-Mountain Marathon, a 3-hour timed event in which runners make their own route selection to visit checkpoints worth different scores with the aim of collecting as many points as possible in the time available.

Roger joined Sale around 1973. In his hey-day, he was no-mean marathon runner with a best of about 2:38 and about 1:13 for the half-marathon. He turned to fell running in later years and there's no sign of his enthusiasm waning.

MANCHEST PARKS GRAND PRIX 2009

You'll remember the Manchester Parks Grand Prix as a series of annual five road races through the summer for every age-group run through the regions parks - Heaton Park, Wythenshawe Park, Boggart Hole Clough, Platt Fields and Debdale Park. At the first race in Gateshead in mid-November, SONIA SAMUELS, a maestro of the mud for over a decade, produced one of her best races to finish a tremendous third among the country's very



best. She was there again for the second race in Sefton Park, Liverpool that combined with the European XC Trials where the objective was to secure tickets to the European Cross-Country Championships in Dublin held on Dec 13th. She did just that! Displaying yet again her fantastic talent in very muddy conditions she finished 6th, enough to be selected as part of the GB & NI team for Dublin. Congratulations, Sonia! Sonia has been pivotal in the club's cross-country success for many years. She's a former double Northern Cross-Country champion & an earlier U/17 & U/20 Champion & last year finished third in the National Cross-Country Championships at Parliament Hill Fields. Read of her performance in Dublin elsewhere.

Still an emerging talent full of promise, CHARLIE HULSON improved from 15th in his U/17 race last year to 5th this year and was never far off the leaders. He'd earlier displayed his pedigree by winning the U/17 races at Heaton Park & Sherdley Park. In the older U/20 category JAMIE RODEN, who finished just behind Charlie in the MACCA races, found the conditions tough and finished 46th. A bit further down the field in 81st place was his team-mate RYAN WORLAND.

We finally welcome ANTONY FORD who finished 12th last year in the senior race and was 13th this year. With a 10k PB of 29.02, he'd earlier won the Lytham St. Anne's '5' in 24.06 and went on the following week to record a massive 10-mile PB of 48.52 in the Guv's '10'

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ENGLAND ATHLETICS



As you read, four of the five winter MACCL parkland cross-country races have taken place. The regions endurance runners have surged around Heaton Park's undulations (October); slugged it through Sherdley Park's mud (November); toughed it through Boggart Hole's bogs (December) and slid on Woodbank Park's frosted slopes (January). There remains only the Wythenshawe match on January 30th to complete this year's cross country league. Full results will follow in the Spring magazine.

U/11's Only our U/11 boy's and girl's teams have completed the league because they participate in only three of the five matches. Since they began participating in 2006/7, the girls have finished 3rd on two occasions and runner's up once. This year, they again were the runners-up to dominant Stockport H & AC who have remained undefeated in this new league. U/17's Victory is already assured for our U/17 girls since they're the only team to have completed the requisite number of matches. We had our usual quota of 15-20 participants brave the early start. MATT BOND finished 3rd just behind Barnes just a week after his massive PB in the Cardiff 10k when he clocked 30.11, knocking almost a minute of his previous best set in Bucharest last year. Onwards & upwards, Matt! JASON BOWERS (35.41) showed he was also ship-shape after injury and, on his tail, PAUL CAPEY (36.35) ran his fastest time by nearly two minutes for this course. Newcomers KEVIN MAHON (38.18) and LEON RICHARDS (39.31) showed they have much to give as they get established into club training sessions and will improve even further. Next was **RUTH PARTRIDGE**! Ruth crossed the line in 39.50 and ought to be satisfied since, when she last ran this race way back in 2003, she clocked a much slower 40.51. FIONA RANDLES also did well to clock 42.24. Zippy O/60 TERRY LONERGAN was running his 124th 10k in a 40 year career. He was pleased to chase Fiona from halfway and "break the tape" with a fellow harrier clocking 42.24. Also winning third in his age-category made his journey from Yorkshire all the more worthwhile. It was also great to see O/45 JIM LAMBE (43.26) consolidate his improvement and move into another level of performance. He's been clocking some of the fastest times of his career and taking note-worthy scalps. One of these was our 'celebrity' O/55 GEOFF BEATTIE. (Well! Geoff's not really a celebrity to us- just another scalp!). Even Geoff's notable sprint wasn't enough to tip Jim to the line. He'll get his revenge! September wasn't a good month for MIRAN APRAHAMIEN, another in the vet/55 category. He clocked 45.42 as preparation for the Swinton half-marathon two weeks later. RICHARD HORWOOD (46.37) was four minutes faster than when he last ran in 2006. Finally, to be admired as much as the winner was our longest serving member, O/70 DON GEORGE (55.11) who was second in his age category & only a few seconds down on last year's time.

BERLIN MARATHON September 20th

STEFFAN SCHUMACHER & LEE WOODS had spent a good part of their summer focused on a lifetime dream to compete in the Berlin Marathon, the home of the current world record of 2:03.59 set by idol Haile Gebrselassie last year. Both prepared thoroughly and aimed to set new PB's with Lee hoping to even get close to 2:55. Steffan had sharpened up in the Isle of man half-Marathon, completing it in an encouraging 1:40 and the first O/50 finisher.

Conditions were very hot and most runners suffered. Lee, with a previous best of 2:58.05, clocked 2.59.06, his second best marathon time. "All in all I was really happy with a sub 3-hour time considering the 30 degree temperatures" he said.

Steffan set off with a PB of 3:25 set in Hamburg in 2004. He started further back than Lee and was, therefore, frustratingly hampered from the outset by wall-to-wall runners along Berlin's narrow streets. When he wanted to stride out, he was busy just concentrating on avoiding being tripped. He hit 'The (Berlin!) Wall' at 20 miles and then needed to stop at every drinking station to re-hydrate. Considering everything, he regarded his 3:48 as "a really bad time... but I wasn't unduly disappointed for I was happy to fulfil my ambition to finally run through the Brandenburg Gate and Andre and me had a great week-end. The night before the race, we met also our friend Reinhard, Lee and his brother-in-law Tom and we had a great night out"

SWINTON HALF-MARATHON September 7th

It's interesting that the half-marathon your editor ran in the early 80's in 69 minutes (and wasn't in the top ten!) was won this year by Luke Reddy (Liverpool AC) in a slower 1:12.57. The race wasn't MIRAN APRAHAMIEN'S finest hour (or nearly two!). He clocked an unimpressive 1:54 - mainly due to having given blood a few days before." It was an interesting experiment (though unintended)", he said, "to see the effect" and he just completely ran out of energy at about half way. MARK TYLDESLEY was a faster 1:46.49 as he prepared for November's Chicago Marathon.

MOURNE MOUNTAIN MARATHON September 20th

For something a bit different, MIRAN took off to Co. Down (Ireland) to participate in the 2-day Mourne Mountain Marathon, a most scenic area of Ireland which 'sweeps down to the sea' and where his mother still resides. He ran with a team-mate but both suffered from some very poor navigational errors and route choice and got timed out on day one but had a much better day two.

CONGLETON HALF-MARATHON October 11th

Recovered from the Mourne Marathon, MIRAN then produced a somewhat better half- marathon than Swinton with 1:47.00 but was still disappointed. Far more satisfied was O/55 JERRY SMITH despite just missing his objective to dip under 1:30! Jerry, with a PB of 1:28.25 from the Great NW Half in Blackpool last February is on a new lease of running life and been pushing back all his frontiers.

BLACKPOOL 'PIER TO PIER '10' October 11th

CALLUM ROWLINSON and his Mum Lynda ran this race on a cold and wet October Sunday. The route was along the coastal path upto Fleetwood, with a cruel sea breeze cross wind all the way. Young Callum finished 6th in an excellent time of 1:02, & took the U21 prize. Lynda also had an excellent run taking the O/45 prize with 1:15. Great also that DAVE MARSH was among the line-up. Dave was/is a very promising runner but never reached his potential. He finished an impressive 1:09.

LIVERPOOL 10k October 14th

Three members were among the 2237 finishers in the Liverpool 10k. First home was youngster MICHAEL KILMARTIN who was reasonably pleased with 36:08 for 17th place but rightly believes he should eventually be a couple of minutes faster. This is an annual outing for O/55 GEOFF BEATTIE. Can you imagine the boost to his confidence with 43:44, his fastest time for that course (I think!) and a minute's improvement on last year? He was in form to exert 'sweet revenge' on JIM LAMBE who'd cruelly pipped him to the post in the Trafford 10k. This time, struggling with a chest infection, Jim was caught 'off-guard' in the last 300m but still produced an excellent time of 43:59 for 218th place.

LYTHAM '5' October 18th

Running his first race in the colours of Sale Harriers following his transfer from Blackpool & Fylde, ANTHONY FORD was challenged for just over a mile by Anthony Valentine of Bolton, at which point the late arriving Valentine called it a day, turned and walked back to the start, leaving the Anthony to proceed unthreatened to win by 1:27 seconds in a course record time of 24.06. The only other harrier present was O/60 TERRY LONERGAN who finished 3rd in his category in another impressive time of 34.07.

ABINGTON MARATHON October 25th

The Abington Marathon was **TIM RAINEY's** 106th marathon or ultramarathon over a sixteen year career, the last ten as a member of Sale Harriers. He wrote, "To say my preparation for the Abingdon marathon was unconventional would be an understatement. I originally entered just to jog around in about 5 hours with a friend who suddenly couldn't run. Therefore, I'd trained only 2 x 20 mile training sessions and topped off my tapering week of 50 miles with the 40 x 200m track session. I decided to try and run my PB pace to halfway; hang on and see what happened...

It turned out that by 6 miles I'd teamed up with a Stockport Harrier I'd met beforehand and a few others and we kept each other going at an even pace until I realised with 3 miles to go that I was going to achieve a PB! I unexpectedly beat my best by 90 seconds to record 3:07.14. Understandably, I was very happy ...and confused!!"

ORIGINAL MOUNTAIN MARATHON (OMM) October 25th)

The OMM is an annual 2-day orienteering event held in different regions of the country. Last year's event in Borrowdale received much unfavourable attention when it was run amidst life-threatening rain and floods. This year's event was in the Brecon Beacons and MIKE ASHBY & MIRAN APRAHAMIEN were our representatives with ROGER ASHBY taking part in a different veteran category. Because of lack of experience and preparation Mike & Miran (and their teammates) entered the shorter, easier, non-scoring 'C' class. The terrain was all bog and tussock grass and the conditions were

changeable, windy and extremely wet under foot. After some navigational problems with two checkpoints on day 1, Mike & his team-mate lay 28th overnight out of over 300 starters and, following a much better second day, finished their class 6th overall and collected a prize of kit vouchers for their efforts. Meanwhile, Miran & his teammate were doing OK for the first two thirds of day one and then Miran fell badly running downhill and tore ankle ligaments resulting in having to hobble the remaining 6k to the finish (but still going to all the checkpoints). As a result, he didn't make day 2. Mike's dad Roger is a seasoned O/65 veteran of the hills & he also had a good run in the Medium-score event. He and his teammate finished 166th, which translated into an impressive 12th out of 76 teams in the Veterans handicap.

GUY FAWKES '10k' October 31st.

As said earlier, JERRY SMITH is one of the club's most improved runners... and rightly so. He's doing the hard work and has unquestionable commitment. That was evidenced by his participation in the tough Guy Fawkes '10', a hilly 10 mile course near Harrogate. Run this year in torrential rain and strong winds, he crossed the line in the stunning Ripley Castle Courtyard in an impressive 1:12:04. "I'm happy considering this tough course" he said.

RUTH PARTRIDGE was spotted in the Conway halfmarathon. Now living and working in North Wales, Ruth's obviously been training hard. She normally aims for sub 1:30's but, following an intimidating incident on the Great Orme, that upset and delayed her, she finished in 1:31.53.



PRESTON '10' November 15th

Whilst most ran the second Manchester Area XC League in Sherdley Park, STEFAN SCHUMACHER & JAMES LAMBE took off for the popular Preston '10'. Steffan's 'sat-nav' let him down so his warm-up had to be a run to the start-line. With little training from a calf strain, he started cautiously. The week following 13th place at the European Cross-country Trials in Liverpool, club newcomer ANTONY FORD was in the form of his life to win this race with a tremendous PB of 48.52, knocking over a minute off his previous best and his first time to dip under the magical 50-minutes. Congratulations! (Interestingly, another club runner SIMON MILLS, won this race last year in 52.24)/. ADAM ELLIOTT made his debut over the distance and should be pleased with 55.51. PAUL GANDY (M55) also had a run out to finish in 1:41.50

PERCY PUD 10k December 6th

This was TIM BRETT first encounter with the course and he also had a good run clocking 1:12.31. Just a month after the Preston '10' M50 STEFAN SCHUMACHER felt fit and recovered and, though slower than Preston, the tough hills made the difference. He just managed to beat O/60 MIKE DUNNE who, apart from the Parkrun 5k's, had been doing little other racing. With minimum distance training, 1:14.43 was an excellent result and just short of the agecategory prize by 30 seconds. There was only thirteen between Stefan and JIM LAMBE at the Preston '10' but here the gap was over two minutes. Jim had not been training again! Finally, RANJIT BENNETT clocked 1:38.18.

GREAT LANGDALE 1 OK December 13th

This picturesque pre-Christmas run touches the festive cheer of the hundreds of participants who run it over two days. On a very hilly course, TERRY LONERGAN led home the annual club troupe in 42.33 – an excellent performance not far short of September's flat and fast Trafford 10k. DAWN HOLDING, training hard for the London marathon, was also in fine form clocking 50:01. This was a superb two minutes faster than last year. Her London training partner was running this event for the second time and was equally pleased with 51.41, a 78 second improvement on last year collecting the L50 prize as a bonus. GRAHAM PADGETT (51:47) was also three minutes faster and collected the 2nd M65 award; JANET FIELDEN clocked 58.40; MICHAEL HUGHES 59:45 and M55 JOHN SMITH recorded 1:00.04
